Yet these controversies are nothing new. In this service, Rev. Chris will reexamine this time in our movement's history and ask how we can better handle such challenges in the future.

"Principle One:

The Inherent Worth and Dignity of Every Person"

Minister's Musings for August 2017

Sometimes it's good to get back to basics and remind ourselves why Unitarian Universalism is so desperately needed in today's world. This year, KUUF will be doing a modified theme-based ministry based on the seven principles and five sources of Unitarian Universalism.

Rev. Barbara Wells tenHove once explained that "[t]he Principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in Unitarian Universalist religious communities."

They may be the closest thing to a group of unifying beliefs UUs will ever have as they are so close to the core of who we are that I have yet to meet anyone in our faith who explicitly disagrees with them. They may believe the principles should be expanded or revised, but not discarded.

Our first principle this month declares that every person has inherent worth and dignity. It's a statement that, no matter who you are, what you've done, or, in the words of Rumi, how many times you've broken your vow, you have inherent worth and dignity and deserve to be treated as such.

It's a radical declaration that you are worthy of deep respect and consideration.

Sometimes the first principle is interpreted to mean that all behavior is acceptable, or on the flip side, to dismiss critics as having inherent worth, just being wrong. Both interpretations of the principle are wrong-headed, as they use the principle to excuse bad actions, either those of others, as in the first case, or our own, as in the latter.

Rather, the first principle demands certain rights for all people, regardless of how they've behaved, and it reminds us that the ultimate goal is to find ways to live in covenant with all people, no matter how much we disagree with them.

There is still much to debate about the first principle, such as where the limits of acceptance are when it comes to a person's behavior, and whether we should recognize that other living beings have the same inherent worth and dignity of humans.

For me, regardless of any interpretations that need to be made about it, the principle stands as a testament that we are a faith that believes in casting a wide net, seeking to minister to people from all walks of life. Truly, it means, as we say in our welcome every Sunday, "No matter who you are or where you are on your spiritual path, you are welcome here!"
