The KUUF Choir: The Director Discusses the Challenges

Editor's note: Everyone in the congregation has been asked to participate in some way that helps the KUUF function. Thus I have asked the Choir Director, Sandra Loy, to describe her responsibilities, with the thought that those seeking some form of KUUF participation



might find this group of interest.

What is your musical background? As a fourth generation

encourage selfless service

musician, my earliest memories are of music. I was raised in the Church of Christ tradition, a

conservative sect in which instrumental music was disallowed during church services, but my early experience with acapella singing prepared me well for my formal education, and especially as an ensemble singer.

Where did you study, and what particular aspect of music interests you?

I received my Bachelor of Vocal Performance from Stetson University, a small, private school in DeLand, Florida.

The Stetson School of Music is an undergraduate institution, and one of the only programs in the U.S. to stage full operas with an all-undergrad cast and crew.

I was, however, an avid choir and chamber singer, with a particular interest in African American spirituals, and 20th century art songs.

What is the most challenging aspect of working with a small choir like ours?

With a small group, music selection is the greatest challenge. Our members are all accomplished people with diverse interests, and therefore they are involved in many activities outside of choir.

This necessitates a flexible format where members attend as they are able. Our selections must thus be flexible as well, with voice parts and instrumentation that can be quickly adjusted as needed to suit whatever personnel we have on hand that day.

Ideally, what would you like to see at KUUF with regards to the choir?

We are in the early stages of developing an outreach program to bring musical joy to the underserved members of our larger community, with a focus on those in nursing homes and hospice care.

I believe in the practice of *Seva* (selfless service) as an essential part of one's personal development, and I feel that my highest calling in this job is to encourage selfless service among

those I lead.

It's easy to get caught up in the concerns of one's ego (recruitment, prestige, being "good" in a musical sense), but the true goal is for us to grow as individuals and in fellowship with one another.

Do you select the choir music? Can anyone in the choir make

suggestions?

I make most of the choir selections, with input from Rev. Chris as well as from our choir members. I'm happy to report that several of our members' knowledge of music literature (and UU music literature in particular) far outstrips my own!

I greatly value the choir members' input, and find that I am always learning new things while in the process of teaching others.

Although I'm not always able to implement every suggestion, I love being surrounded by enthusiastic people whose knowledge and ideas allow me to broaden my own musical horizons.

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The KUUF choir is small. What would you say to the Fellowship in order to increase the choir's size?

Join us!

In speaking with members of our congregation and with people in general, I repeatedly encounter the same false dichotomy: that there are some people who "can sing" versus everyone else who "can't."

This is always the result of harsh or negative feedback during one's formative years. Certainly there are varying levels of aptitude and refinement but ultimately, I believe that musical expression is an inherently human trait that we can all access.

It saddens me that there are so many people whose capacity for musical joy was damaged at a young age. I welcome the opportunity to help anyone who wants to heal from that experience and reclaim their musicality.

Our choir rejects ableism in all its forms: our doors and hearts are open to all!
