"Keep Calm and Carry On": The Worship Committee Confronts the KUUF Sunday Schedule

The Worship Committee met in December to work on the Sunday schedule for January. With Rev. Chris gone, the KUUF has returned to a layled fellowship. Board President Amlan Mukherjee stated in his message to the congregation that "The Board has recognized that the Worship Committee, with everyone's help, will plan and coordinate Sunday services at least until June of 2018."

Barry Fink has graciously offered to be the initial chair of the Worship Committee, and in December she introduced to those who attended the meeting, Faith Rocket, an on-line source of related UU monthly topics, sermons, and readings our fellowship may well rely on for the foreseeable future.

Besides Faith Rocket, the committee, through Barry, has contacted several upper Midwest UU ministers regarding their interest in leading a Sunday service for us. Three have agreed and will visit us early in the new year.

Several KUUF Members have also stepped forward and volunteered for Forums or as lay leaders during a regular service.

The second Sunday will continue to be devoted to a Forum as usual.

Your participation on the committee will help make our 2018 schedule a success. The committee would like to hear your ideas. The Weekly Bulletin will announce the date and time for the next meeting.

The Worship committee's responsibilities are to prepare the calendar of topics for the month, which the members will submit to the newsletter editor, generate the information for the weekly Order of Service, serve as readers for different components of the service and coordinate with the visiting ministers.

Faith Rocket Website to Assist with KUUF Service Planning

The KUUF Worship Committee has enrolled in "Faith Rocket," an on-line service offered by the UU Church of the Larger Fellowship, primarily to assist lay-led UU congregations and those who wish help in leading a detailed, faith-led life.

This service was formerly known as "Church in a Box," but, now, in our digital age, has moved to the internet. You may wish to explore a sample month's services at http://faithrocket.org/

The website, for which the KUUF pays a small, monthly fee, offers complete Sunday Services a month at a time. These include opening words, sermons, and daily devotionals for those who wish them. The service also offers podcasts, videos, reflections and quotations, and even small group session materials and children's RE questions.

On or about the 15th of each month, subscribers may access information for the following month.

Except for the sample, which may be viewed at any time, the site is secured by a password that changes each month. Contact anyone on the Worship Committee for this password.

Library Briefs

Editor's Note: This month's column ran in this newsletter several years ago; it seems as pertinent now as it was then. _Editor

Do you remember when you first came to our fellowship?

How were you treated?

What kept you coming back?

Now, as a member, how do you treat guests that visit us on Sunday? How can you do a better job of welcoming our visitors and supporting congregational growth?

Our library contains a wonderful DVD, "Ideas for Growth: Welcoming the Newcomer," produced by the Jefferson Unitarian Church of Golden, Colorado. Jefferson is a large fellowship, and it did not achieve their size by accident.

The video includes concrete steps that can be taken to improve hospitality. For example, Segment #1 covers "Repelling Fewer Visitors."

This section states that the current growth of our entire denomination is a dismal 1% per year; "6% of churches account for 2/3 of national growth;" and our sluggish growth and slow decline nullify each other.

The video recommends three steps. First, say "Hello." Cordially greet unfamiliar faces-establish a bond--and offer to sit with them.

Second, "Let visitors know they are important and you are glad they came."

Above all, develop an atmosphere of welcoming.

The DVD offers a bonus sermon--"Reflections on the Experience of a Newcomer." Those in our Fellowship who have heard this sermon have agreed that it is a prizewinner. The video is ready for checkout.
