Board to Meet with Candidate on 8/26 to Discuss Possible Lay Ministerial Position

Paul Mitchell, a candidate for the position of Lay Minister at KUUF, will meet with the Board on August 26 to discuss his qualifications.

If the Board decides to move forward on his candidacy, the group will ask the Personnel Committee to check on the candidate's background and references. The next step is with the Finance Committee to determine what funds are available for a lay minister, and for how long. Presumably, if a hire occurs, it will be for the remainder of the fiscal year, but it could be shorter.

Finally, if the candidate successfully reaches this point, he could be hired as an independent contractor, according to Horst Schmidt, Board VP.

Board Establishes Ad Hoc Committees to Consider Future Ministry Leadership

According to Dave Watkins, Board President, the KUUF Board has begun investigating options regarding ministerial leadership.

"We have set up two ad hoc committees," Watkins says. "The first, composed of Horst Schmidt and Jenn Donovan, will interview candidates for a lay ministerial position." At this time, Paul Mitchell has shown interest, and the Schmidt/Donovan committee has met with him.

"The second," Watkins says, is the Ministerial Task Force. It is much larger and will review all options relating to the Fellowship's plans for spiritual leadership in the future."

The second committee members are Horst Schmidt, Jane Hiltunen, Sharon Levine, Barry Fink, Miriam Pickens, and Tammy Gajewski. Harriet King will chair this group.

This Ministerial Task Force (MTF) will begin their work with a survey, according to Horst Schmidt. "Each MTF member will be assigned four UU congregations similar in size to KUUF, and ask them what ministry system they use, and whether it works well for them. The MTF will then meet on September 6 to compare notes on what we have learned."

Copper Country Habitat for Humanity has partnered with the Portage Health Foundation to help rebuild the Copper Country community damaged by the Father's Day flood, according to Carol Ekstrom.

"Projects could include building a new home or completing critical repair projects on damaged homes," Ekstrom says.

"We will receive additional help from *Habitat MI* and *Habitat International*. They will send a Blitz Build team or Caravan team up to help with new home builds and possibly one or more critical repairs," Ekstrom says. "We will still need plenty of local volunteers. Updates will be posted when we have more details."

Chants for Meditation

The Keweenaw Unitarian Universalist Choir Recorded this on November, 2009 by engineer Damon Morris at the E. L. Wright building lobby in Hancock.

The chants include "Meditation on Breathing," "Om Shanti," "Earth Air Fire Water," and "Dona Nobis Pachem," among others.

While the technical information on the CD is not entirely known, the recording engineer might be the son of former minister, Sydney Morris, whose office was in the E.L. Wright building.

Our Choir Director, Sandra Loy, says that "Chants for Meditation" is a diverse compilation spanning several traditions. Chant and mantra have been practiced for thousands of years to promote spiritual awakening, mental discipline, emotional health and physical wellness—and these benefits are accessible to everyone."
