Sunday Schedule for July 2019

July 7: Paul will lead us in a Flower Communion.

The Flower Communion is an annual ritual that celebrates beauty, human uniqueness, diversity, and community.

Created in 1923 by Unitarian minister Norbert Capek [KAH-peck] of Prague, Czechoslovakia, the Flower Ceremony was introduced to the US by Rev. Maya Capek, Norbert's widow.

In this ceremony, everyone in the congregation brings a flower, placing it on the altar or in a shared vase. After the congregation and minister bless the flowers, they are redistributed. Each of us will take home a different flower than the one brought. Bring a flower and join us! (If you forget to bring a flower, we will have enough extras.)

July 14: (Forum) YOUTHAITI (Youth+ Haiti).

The Marquette UU Congregation has committed to working with *Youthaita*, a Haitian-led organization operating in rural parts of that impoverished country, A multigenerational group will be traveling there to serve the people of Duchity in the Spring of 2021. This follows a commitment to our 6th Principle: "Improving the global community."

In this forum, members from the Marquette UU "Helping in Haiti 2021" team will describe Youthaiti work, background on Haitian history, and Marquette's participation in this program.

July 21: Rev. Laurie Bushbaum, guest minister, will present "A Thousand Paths to Power." Blurb: A folktale about a stonecutter and the words of black feminist writer Adrienne Maree Brown create a juxtaposition about power. Is it good? Bad? What are its sources and expressions? Those who are accustomed to the inheritors of power must work at learning other ways of understanding power.

Rev. Laurie Bushbaum is a UU minister from Minneapolis who is taking a break from many years of Parish Ministry to explore the power of art and her sewing machine. Currently, she teaches sewing to the homeless, those in shelters, recent immigrants, and as part of a few non-profits that serve those in need. She will be in Houghton for a long weekend leading the women's retreat, teaching a class on landscape quilting, and preaching here on Sunday morning. **Potluck Sunday. Bring a dish to pass**

July 28: Paul will speak on Intersectionality and Our Faith

We will start with stories of the experience of intersectionality shared by KUUF member Jessica Anderson. We'll review a working definition of intersectionality and conclude with developing an understanding of how intersectionality informs the present and future of our faith.

Adult Faith Development on Intersectionality to Meet Wednesday, July 24th, 6-7:30

What is intersectionality?

On Wednesday, July 24, from 6:00pm to 7:30pm at the KUUF Office, KUUF will hold a facilitated discussion on intersectionality.

The group will also watch a TED Talk from Dr. Kimberlee Crenshaw, the originator of the term.

The evening will be co-facilitated by KUUF member Jessica Anderson and Paul Mitchell.

KUUF Mulls Possible Community Project(s)

After the service on Sunday, June 23rd, thirty fellowship members remained to discuss a possible community project.

Lay Minister Paul Mitchell explained that working as a UU group on one or more community projects will offer several advantages.

One is that by interacting with the local community KUUF members might be able to overcome confusion about UU beliefs and demonstrate our ideals. In his sermon during the Sunday service, before the meeting, Paul read a few lines from a Spokane newspaper article that said UUs are informed by an atheist perspective. While many UUs are indeed atheists, this statement adds more confusion than clarity to an understanding of the UU perspective.

Probably, Paul said, many in our community are similarly unsure of the KUUF perspective on life and religious values. "UU is not well known across the Midwest. These projects offer an opportunity to sustain and expand our outreach in a non-evangelizing way. We need a way to help the community, and to help ourselves."

The thirty members at this first meeting seemed to agree on the usefulness of a project but selecting a topic will be a challenge. Among other concerns, a topic must be useful to the community, yet not currently being handled by another group.

One possibility concerns food insecurity: providing a broader menu to the area. Local food

pantries rely on canned and packaged goods, not fresh food.

A second meeting following the July 7th service will continue this topic selection, followed by planning to determine who will do what tasks.

Whatever the group chooses should be an enduring project continuing indefinitely into the future.

"KUUF Projects," Paul explains, "will help others as well as develop a relationship that will be transformative."
