Chadde will be honored in March at an Awards Ceremony at the 2020 MSTA Conference in Lansing




KUUF Audience Responds to Program on Plight of Japanese-Americans in WW II

After the KUUF program on Japanese-Americans' experiences during WW II (Dec 15), several audience members responded with thoughts or memories they wished to share.

Miyoko Wisti shared this: "I grew up in Japan after the war, and I was totally unaware of this event."

Jim Belote said that the talk reminded him of his early life on Oahu during the bombing at Pearl Harbor. "My parents were missionaries, so my early life was spent in various locations in the

Pacific.



"On Oahu, like everyone else, I was given a registration card testifying to my age (six), nationality (US), and occupation (student). My last name was misspelled

on the card, but this didn't seem to make me a security risk. I was also given a gas mask in case it was needed.

"A neighbor's shelter was much superior to ours, so we often went there.

"Ironically, considering the topic from the recent sermon, the neighbors--kind, generous people-were Japanese-American."
