Caring Committee

The 2022/23 Caring Committee has been working to provide:
1. "Relief services" when requested by a caregiver who needs a break.
2. Remembering members who live alone through "random acts of caring" which entails the delivery of "a surprise caring bag of treats".
3. Helping a person or family from the general community, if help is requested with rent or food money. This year we helped with rent money. KUUF makes the payment in lieu of just giving the requesting person the rent money.
4. The Committee works closely with Heidi who "provides pastoral care" when needed.

Grow An Extra Row

Our third year (2022) of the "Grow an Extra Row" project was not as successful as in the two previous years. The season began with Paul Mitchell installing an irrigation system in the communal garden, followed by a well-attended communal garden work party that involved raking, rock picking, planting seeds/seedlings, placing a weed barrier and restringing the fishing line fence, and an enjoyable picnic lunch.

Unfortunately, due to high winds and perhaps poor soil (??), the garden did not produce as expected. Thanks to the generosity of other KUUF members gardens, we were able to do one extra-large delivery to several families. The communal garden will be 'closed' for the 2023 growing season but we are still hoping members will contribute enough produce to provide at least two deliveries for several families. - Wrote a Letter to the Editor in response to a cartoon in the local paper depicting immigrants as terrorist.

- Supported gun laws in Houghton County, and sent postcards to thank Commissioner Gretchen Janssen for her support of our Michigan Gun Laws.
- Invited a presenter to forums discussing the 8th Principle and the proposed changes to UU nationally related to Article 2
- Worked with Michigan UU the vote.

This willingness to provide for children is deeply appreciated and benefits all of the KUUF community.

Our Sunday Dream Team has provided a Moment for all Ages on Sundays and children have been actively engaged during this time which benefits all in attendance on Sundays.

Stacy and others have offered activities that are family-friendly, including, making bird feeders, gathering pine branches to make a meditative spiral and get-togethers for children and families to play together.

Personnel Committee

With the reminder that the Personnel Committee deals with issues involving non<u>-ministerial</u> employees, KUUF was fortunate this past year in that we retained all our existing staff and successfully brought a new Tech Communication Provider position into full operation. The Personnel Committee held conversations with staff to evaluate, support, and share expectations. The Personnel Committee reviewed the UUA wage and salary guidelines and made recommendations to the Board regarding compensation. This Committee also ensures that required employment postings are up to date and that Workers Compensation premiums are accurate and paid.

KUUF WORSHIP COMMITTEE 2022-2023 REPORT

This year has been successful for the Committee. Our Search Committee, after extensive work, was unable to secure a full-time minister through the UUA search process. We were able to recruit Bucky Beach, Carol Grafford, Rachel Tarpey and Sarah Semmler Smith to provide Sunday services, starting in September, 2022. Pastors Beach and Smith are Lutheran ministers, the former retired from Good Shepherd Lutheran Church and the latter a minister at Finlandia University. Carol Grafford is a Buddhist teacher while Rachel Tarpey is a member of our congregation. All were engaged by the board on one-year contracts.

As we were about to institute our service schedule in September with them, Elen received an inquiry from a UU Minister in Ashland, Stacy Craig, about a quarter-time position at KUUF. After interviewing Pastor Craig, the Board of Trustees agreed to a one-year contract.

We have been happy with the quality of our services based on member feedback. We hope to continue with them during the next year. Unfortunately, Rachel Tarpey is unable to continue due to other responsibilities. We continue to maintain a library of recorded services from UU MidAmerica for use as needed. We want to thank Paul Mitchell for seeking out and recruiting the original group of presenters.

We continue with our combination of in-person and virtual services. Janeen Stephenson has taken on the role of virtual service coordinator. Leonard Bohmann, her husband, relinquished his duties of running the virtual services when we hired a paid staff member, Davi Sprague, who has done a good job in that role. Hybrid services are continuing as it allows senior members and those who live elsewhere to continue their connection with KUUF year around.

There was extensive discussion about air quality which resulted in the construction of two air purifiers to lower the CO2 level at BHK as well as a way to reduce possible COVID infections. We continued asking members to wear masks as a public health concern. Our Regathering Committee is removing the mask requirement as COVID is no longer a pandemic. However, members should decide for themselves whether or not they will wear masks based on their particular circumstances. COVID has not gone away as people, at greatly reduced rates, are still becoming infected.

The Committee has been successful in recruiting members to do the chalice lighting and closing, as needed, at our services.

Since we are "broadcasting" our services via Zoom, our music director found after researching that we need to pay a licensing fee of \$300 annually for the

right to perform certain songs. This is both a legal and ethical choice on the part of KUUF.

Childcare and Moments for All Ages during services continue. Janeen Stephenson had responsibility for lining up two adults to go upstairs when children are present. Miriam Pickens has picked up that role going forward.

Finally, Jack Jobst and Janeen Stephenson have decided to retire from the Committee. We thank them for their service on the Committee as well as many other roles at KUUF.

We wish to give our heartfelt gratitude for the work of those mentioned above during the past year as well as members who have volunteered. Their help is what makes our Fellowship.

2023 KUUF Green Sanctuary Committee Annual Report

Green Sanctuary's aspiration is expressed in its vision: "Together, we can create a world in which all people make reverence, gratitude, and care for the living earth central to our lives." This aspiration is translated into Action Projects. The projects focus on four areas: Worship and Celebration; Religious Education; Environmental Justice; Sustainable Living in this time of Climate change.

We have developed 25 Action Projects since our start in 2015. Fourteen are currently are currently active, and two have moved to other committees. Many of the projects went well this year. If you are interested in a detailed report with photos, contact a committee member.

1. Forum - Winter Gardening.

If you've enjoyed gardening, or eating fresh produce this summer and don't want to stop, join us Sunday, we'll hear from Boersma Farm (Hoop gardening); Minnie's Farm (aquaponics); Living Vitamins (Microgreens). This will be followed by a Green Tour of the SDH, Sustainability Demonstration House and their hydroponics project.

2. Worship Service - Water and the Ways We Worship

For Sunday's water ceremony, we will reflect on the varying ways that we nourish our spirit in nature, especially in and around water. There will be time for each person to share what water means to them. In preparation for Sunday, SDH hydroponics set-up you could think about what water means to you for recreation, work, spirituality, nourishment, etc. Try to craft a reflection that you could share in less than two minutes.

3. Forum - Indigenous Identity and Spirituality

Dr. Martin Reinhardt (Anishinaabe Ojibway) will share insights about the relationship between identity and spirituality. Reinhardt asserts that a collective recentering of our shared human identities is essential to the health of Mother Earth and our relationship with her and our plant and animal relatives. Join us for an engaging discussion about living in circles and spiraling through time.

Presenter Bio: Dr. Martin Reinhardt is an Anishinaabe Ojibway citizen of the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians from Michigan. He is a tenured professor of Native American Studies at Northern Michigan University. He is the president of the Michigan Indian Education Council, and the lead singer and songwriter for the band Waawiyeyaa (The Circle). His current research focuses on revitalizing relationships between humans and Indigenous plants and animals of the Great Lakes Region. He holds both a Bachelor's and a Master's degree in Sociology, and a Ph.D. in Educational Leadership. His doctoral research focused on Indian education and the law with a special focus on treaty educational provisions.

Dr. Reinhardt's Cookbook entitled Decolonizing Diet Project was purchased and added to our KUUF library.

Forum - What's Next for Energy in the UP?

Change is the new normal in energy. Not just price swings for propane, there are more choices for transportation and powering our homes. What was learned by the UP Energy Task Force?

Presenter Bio: Jenn Hill is a consultant with 5 Lakes Energy, a statewide energy policy think tank, focusing on energy policy and analysis. She has 25 years' experience in government, business, nonprofits and philanthropy. Most recently, she served for 2 years on the UP Energy Task Force looking at our region's future energy needs and options. She is in her second term as a Marquette City Commissioner (since 2018). She earned a M.S. in environmental planning at MIT and a BA cum laude from Barnard College. A 4-H kid with family roots in the industrial and agricultural Midwest, Ms. Hill is the third generation in her family to fish in the UP, and the first lucky enough to live here.

Forum, Sustainability, Here and There

The term "sustainability" is everywhere. It's hard to find a product or a company that isn't touting some sustainability accomplishments or commitments. Right here at Michigan Tech, there is a person (me!) with "sustainability" in their job title! But what does it mean and why does it matter? We'll explore some foundational concepts and trends around sustainability and discuss how "sustainability thinking" can alter trajectories at the individual, organizational, community, and global levels. It will be an interactive session with some live Zoom polls and moments for personal reflection, so please plan on engaging with your thoughts and ideas.

Presenters Bio: Alan Turnquist is the Director of Sustainability and Resilience at Michigan Tech. Previously, he held various positions at Michigan Tech and the University of Wisconsin-Madison, mostly managing programs focusing on sustainability and food systems. He studied at the UW-Madison where he earned a Bachelor's degree in Latin American Studies, a Master's in

Applied Economics, and a Juris Doctorate with a focus on environmental policy. He lives in Houghton with his wife, Erin Syth, and two curious children (Lila, 7 and Sami, 3).

ELEVEN MINI-GRANTS BOOST SCHOOL GARDENS

KUUF in collaboration with Michigan Tech Center for Science & Environmental Outreach (CSEO), Lake Superior Stewardship Initiative, Friends of the Land of Keweenaw (FOLK), and Keweenaw Land Trust, created a \$75 Garden Mini-Grant Program to help start or improve eleven existing school or community gardens before the end of the school year. B-K SHARE is our Sustainability Education Project for BHK families/students and KUUF members/Kids RE. We started 3'25'22, with the installation of our jointly owned composter.

Next, we will experiment with recycling plastic film, start a pollinator garden, tend our tree farm. and possibly build a solar demonstration project.
